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


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Lindsey's Recipe — FRESH GINGER, PARSNIP AND ORANGE SOUP

Ingredients: -

1lb/500gr parsnips, peeled and chopped 2 medium onions, peeled and chopped 1in/2.5cm piece fresh root ginger, peeled and chopped 3tbsp oil (sunflower) 1oz/25gr butter Grated rind and juice of 2 oranges 1 1/2pt/1L chicken or vegetable stock salt and freshly ground black pepper.



Method :-

Heat oil and butter together in pan.

Add onions and saute for a few minutes until they are soft and transparent.

Add parsnips and ginger and cook for a further 5 minutes.

Add grated orange rind and the stock.

Bring to simmering point, half-cover the pan and simmer for 35-40 minutes.

Allow to cool a little then liquidise.

For a really velvety smooth soup pour through a sieve into a clean pan.

Stir in the orange juice and season.

Reheat to serve, and serve with tiny croutons and chopped parsley sprinkled on top.


What the classes are doing

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Gardening Tips

Flowers Sow sweet peas. Those sown earlier in the autumn can be potted on and placed where they will get plenty of light. Plant lily bulbs during mild spells.

Buy summer bulbs. Cut off old hellebore leaves. Cut away Iris unguicularis leaves to expose the flowers.

Start cutting back grasses and other perennials left for winter interest or leave a few more months as cover for wild-life. During mild dry spells, you can still lift and divide herbaceous perennials.

Prune apple and pear trees while the leaves are off the trees.

Take off about 10-20% of the overall canopy. Work round the tree evenly.

Note. The more you prune, the stronger the regrowth. If you have pruned too hard, your tree is likely to produce vigorous upright branches, which crowd the crown. However, any growing in a convenient place can be pruned by about a third to encourage branching. Otherwise remove to their point of origin.

Aim to take out some of the old wood each winter to stimulate new growth. Most of the fruiting wood should be quite young – one to four years old wood fruits best. Aim to keep the centre open.

Avoid a 'hair cut'. If you only prune the top branches, all the new growth will shoot up from there producing a thicket of non-fruiting shoots. It's a thinning out process, selectively removing or shortening a branch here and there. Focus on areas where the growth seems more crowded.

Avoid very big and very little pruning cuts. Even with very old trees, resist the temptation to prune off large limbs – these are a risk of decay. Generally, avoid cutting into branches more than 10-12cm (4-5in) in diameter. Avoid leaving a stub. Most pruning cuts will be branches between 1-5cm (1/2-2in). A fully pruned tree might only need 10-20 pruning cuts in total. Don't use a pruning paint on apple or pear trees, but may be used on plums or cherries.

Vegetables

Regularly harvest outer leaves of lettuce, chard, spinach and kale to provide a steady supply of food and to allow strong new growth of the central leaves.

Buy seed potatoes and onion sets.

In the temperatures we're now having, chervil and claytonia (Miners' lettuce) continue to grow outside. These can be harvested over Christmas with more to come.

Traditionally green manures have been used over winter to add manure to the soil. Alternatively cover the soil with

compost or woodchip; the soil is covered, but not growing any leaves which harbour slugs. Also it's very quick to sow or transplant in March in soil which is perfect for new seedlings.

After rhubarb leaves have died back cut them off to expose the growing points for winter cold.

Wildlife Help birds in winter by placing fat blocks in wire cages, peanuts, and seeds. Thrushes and blackbirds favour fruit, so scatter over-ripe apples, raisins and songbird mixes on the ground. Rats can be a problem. Try moving feeding stations around the garden, if possible, to reduce a build-up of spilt food and only put out enough that is likely to be eaten quickly. You could think of planting berrying and fruiting trees and shrubs. Leave a shallow dish of water at ground



level – check it's not frozen during frosty weather. Leave healthy herbaceous and hollow stemmed plants unpruned until early spring to provide homes for overwintering insects. Make a hole in the ice on ponds to allow wildlife to drink. Don't hit or crack the ice as this can send shockwaves through the water that harms fish and other wildlife. A ball floated on the water will keep it open.

General maintenance Rake up any winter debris and leaves of the borders. Clear up weedy beds ready for mulching in the spring. Raise containers onto feet or bricks if not already done so to prevent them sitting in the wet.

As you are aware, parking for the Village Hall is very limited and the Village Hall Committee have been made aware that a number of vehicles have started to park around the Hall when they are not actual users of the Hall. The Hall is a village asset and is dependent on the income it receives from its regular hirers and they, in turn, rely on the ability to park their vehicles adjacent to the Hall – this is particularly true of the TN22 Clubs who are catering for the elderly and disabled. Therefore, the Village Hall Committee strongly request that the parking around the Hall is kept clear for users of the Hall only and ask other vehicle owners to park elsewhere.


Wilderness Wood Monthly News

DRAFT MINUTES OF THE MEETING of Hadlow Down Parish Council

Held in Hadlow Down Village Hall, Hadlow Down

at 7pm on Tuesday 5th December 2023

Present: Councillors: Michael Lunn (ML) Chair (+WDC), Peter Weston (PW) Vice Chair, Ben Floyd (BF), David Munday (DM) and Damon Wellman (DW).

In attendance: Vicki Rutt (Clerk), Cllr. Bob Standley (ESCC) and 11 members of the public.

ML started the meeting by explaining as this was the last PC meeting before Christmas to wish to all residents of the Parish a very Merry Christmas and safe festive period for December.

198. PUBLIC QUESTIONS

A resident stated that there are some trees down in Brick Kiln Lane and Spring Lane. They also explained that there has been a loose pack of dogs that have been spotted in the fields in the area. The same resident has been liaising with Wealden District Council [WDC] about an abandoned touring caravan which has been dumped by a third party, it is subject to a separate investigation and the landowner is trying to get its removal. Another resident asked who to send his petition too on the A272 speeding issues, it was agreed to send to Cllr Standley. A resident thanked the PC for arranging for the drains to be cleared on the A272. She reported a narrow strip on the Toll (A272) that needs some sort of warning signs as it is becoming dangerous. A resident raised the planning application at Broadreed Farm and asked the Council to consider the number of large vehicles and whether the location was appropriate for such vehicles.

- 199. APOLOGIES AND REASON FOR ABSENCE None.
- **200. CO-OPTION OF TWO COUNCILLORS** ML reported that the Council have two Councillor vacancies and they have two candidates. Both candidates introduced themselves of why they would like to become a Parish Councillor and then a vote took place. Both candidates received unanimous votes so both candidates were co-opted.

19:13 Cllr Alan Hobbs and Cllr Stephen Lester joined the meeting.

201. PCSO SUE CHOPPIN TO GIVE UPDATE ON LOCAL POLICING AND CURRENT ISSUES

ML welcomed PCSO Sue Choppin to the meeting and congratulated her on recently winning the 'Emergency Service Person of the Year'. PCSO Choppin introduced herself and explained the areas she covered. Regarding the recent burglaries in the area, they are deemed a well organised gang and should not be approached. If you see anything suspicious, please call 999 or email PCSO Choppin in a non emergency. Please can all residents be aware that there are a lot of scams happening at this time of year so be mindful. The question was asked what can be done about drones flying over your house, PCSO Choppin stated that not a lot can be done. DW stated that he too had seen this loose pack of dogs, and it was frightening, PCSO Choppin confirmed that it would be a Police matter and it is worth contacting the Rural Crime Team who could attend the site and speak to the dog owner as they are known. Speeding in the village was discussed and PCSO Choppin sent an email earlier to ML from an Officer at Sussex Safer Roads who had review the data received from the two SIDs. He stated 'The data shows that out of 35 counts ¼ of that value is over the speed limit using be 85th percentile 23% is above the limit, this would require enforcement, after speaking to the traffic manager, we have opted to put this through our triage board at the next meeting for this to be discussed and action plan formulated to justify enforcement. The next meeting takes place in December and I will feedback to the council what action will be taken.'

- **202. DECLARATIONS OF INTEREST** 205i/b Tulleys Farm, ML declared a pecuniary interest and BF a personal interest. Item 212/5, DM declared a pecuniary interest.
- **203. MINUTES OF THE MEETINGS** held on the 7th November 2023 and 14th November 2023 were agreed and signed as a true record (previously circulated).
- 204. OUTSTANDING ACTIONS FROM PREVIOUS MEETINGS:
 - i. Action Log 2023 Clerk reported from the action log which is available on the village website.
 - ii. Clerks report This was noted (previously circulated).

PLANNING:

i. PLANNING APPLICATIONS:

a. WD/2023/2127/F for LITTLE BROADREED FARM, DOG KENNEL LANE, HADLOW DOWN, TN22 4EL

Proposed external alterations and change of use to existing commercial building and external car parking area to allow the storage and servicing of executive vehicles.

The PC voted: 5 against and 2 abstained. Objection is due to the traffic impact and traffic movements, traffic impacts the Ashdown Forest, the environmental impact regarding use of cleaning materials and the site being an AONB.

b. WD/2023/7039 for LAND FORMING PART OF TULLEYS FARM, FIVE CHIMNEYS LANE, HADLOW DOWN, TN22 4DX

Agricultural building for the storage of machinery and hay.

ML did not take part in this discussion. BF could join the debate but was unable to vote.

The PC voted: 3 objected and 2 abstained. Reasons are due to the development being potentially harmful to the visual amenities of the AONB contrary to Saved Policy EN6 of Wealden Local Plan 1998 and paragraph 176 of the National Planning Policy Framework 2021. The mass and scale are also not appropriate, and the visual impact is excessive.

c. WD/2023/1796/F for WILDERNESS COTTAGE, 1 WILDERNESS LANE, HADLOW DOWN, TN22 4HX

Replacement shed. Change of use from garden storage to dog grooming area.

The PC voted: 4 against and 3 abstained. Objection is due to parking issues, access and over commercialism of a small garden.

ii. APPROVED APPLICATIONS

WD/2023/2184/LBR for CLAYLANDS, STONEHURST LANE, HADLOW DOWN, TN22 4ED.

Additional works associated with the full re-roofing of this listed property (granted listed building consent wd/2021/2063/lb) comprising structural repairs to the existing roof structure, chimney repointing, replacement casement windows within existing dormers, insulation to lofts, copper pipe lagging along with consent sought retrospectively for the installation of 2no.velux rooflight windows and their proposed replacement with more sympathetic conservation style rooflight windows.

WD/2023/2173/F for COLES FARM, WILDERNESS LANE, HADLOW DOWN, TN22 5HS

Conversion of the existing barn to create a dwelling, curtilage, parking and wider landscaping and ecological enhancements.

iii. Enforcement updates

ML stated that the PC has received a number of updates. It was agreed that the Clerk would keep an enforcement log to be referred to when needed. Action 1. ML updated that as earlier stated in public questions, the caravan at Wander Down, Stonehurst Lane is being investigated and it was not placed there with permission from the landowner and its removal is being actioned. PW updated that the body of water at Fishpond wood was looked into, but the matter has now been closed as no further action. The enforcement appeal at Drakes Den has stalled and they are awaiting a visit from an Inspector. It was agreed that this will be responded to stating how concerned HDPC are on this matter and the delay in any action. Action 2.

206. REPORTS FROM CLLR.BOB STANDLEY, ESCC & CLLR MICHAEL LUNN, WDC - written reports had been submitted and are published on the village website.

Cllr Standley reported that it is unlikely that the A272 speed signage petition will be ready for the February ESCC meeting but to get it to him ASAP. He confirmed that ESH did come out to look at the concrete in the drain at School Lane but the wrong drain was looked at. BF raised this drain and asked who owns it and who is responsible as it can't be the landowner. Cllr Standley will looked into this. Action 3.

The dangerous pothole on the main road near the Mayfield Flat was discussed, Clerk to report again. Action 4. Cllr Lunn as WDC District Councillor reported that the recycling bins at Wilderness Wood have been removed despite opposition and no consultation with PC or residents. Standing Orders dropped.

Resident asked if the land is being reinstated, ML will ask about this. Action 5. He explained that the Local Plan is developing, and he is receiving regular briefings. It is proposed to be presented to Full Council on 8th February. Standing orders reinstated.

207. HIGHWAYS:

i. Blocked drains update – this is an ongoing issue and will remain on agenda so can be monitored.
